CENTRAL EAST FLORIDA

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY

The 6,555-acre Lake Blue Cypress has many spotted sunfish, catfish, shellcracker, bluegill and largemouth bass, but the lake is best known for its black crappie. The primary baits used for this species are small jigs and live minnows. The fish become more active as water temperatures drop. Areas of structure or cover such as cypress trees along the shoreline provide many spots to catch largemouth bass. The inshore waters of this area are fishing enthusiasts' favorites. Tides do not affect movements of fish here because the area is largely isolated by barrier islands.

Garcia/Miami Lakes Reservoir measures 3,150 acres, with water depths reaching as deep as six feet. The reservoir is noted for high populations of smaller largemouth bass, but it usually produces a number of trophysized fish during the winter and early spring. Largemouth bass fishing is enjoyed among the various types of vegetation throughout the lake. Bass

anglers work from the deeper waters in the northwestern corner using live shiners, plastic worms and soft plastic jerkbaits. Other popular sport fish found in the reservoir include black crappie, bluegill and redear sunfish.

ST. LUCIE COUNTY

Anglers can enjoy the shallow waters of the *Indian River Lagoon*, which has an average depth of about five feet. The brackish lagoon waters provide seagrass beds, where spotted seatrout, redfish and snook hide.

Upstream, freshwater fishermen can find bluegill, black crappie and largemouth bass swimming under the marshy lily pads in the *Savannas*. Made up of more than 550 acres of freshwater ponds and marshlands, the *Savannas* consists of two parks run by both the state and the county. The area can be fished from the banks, by canoe or by small boats with electric motors. No gasoline-powered motors are allowed in the Savannas.

VOLUSIA COUNTY

The 46,000-acre Lake George was named one of Florida's Top 10 largemouth bass fishing lakes by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Largemouth bass thrive in this lake and can be caught using live shiners and artificial baits. The Florida black bass is king in the St. Johns River yearlocal round. but guides consider November through February and April through June to be

peak periods.

During fall and winter, the waters produce striped bass that commonly weigh up to 12 pounds. Using live shad or shiners, jigs and shad-imitating crankbaits around the jetties and bombing range in the lake may produce good results.

BREVARD COUNTY

Largemouth bass can be caught year-round on the 4,600-acre *Lake Washington*. Fishing enthusiasts use plastic worms, crankbaits, spinnerbaits and top water lures to attract fish.

Black crappie also are caught throughout the year on *Lake Washington*, often in open water with artificial bait, such as small jigs and minnows.

Lake Winder is located five miles upstream of Lake Poinsett in the St. Johns chain and can only be reached by an extended boat ride from Lake Poinsett. Largemouth bass are plentiful from late fall through spring, around emergent and submerged plant communities that extend into the lake.

OKEECHOBEE COUNTY

Lake Okeechobee is the county's most famous waterway. Known as the "Crappie Capital of the World," other species found here include largemouth bass, bluegill, redear sunfish and catfish. Crappies are best caught with minnows and jigs in open water areas. Golden shiners, spinnerbaits and crankbait are among the best to catch largemouth bass.

INDIAN RIVER LAGOON

Central East Florida boasts a unique fishing location that even nonanglers enjoy. The Indian River Lagoon is an estuary system and an inshore marine waterway that begins north of Merritt Island and stretches down the coast to south of Fort Pierce. This area has 1,350 plant species, 310 bird species and 700 fish species-both saltwater and freshwater. The inshore waters of this area are fishing enthusiasts' favorites because they surround barrier islands, so tides do not affect movements of fish.

Containing five ocean inlets, the Indian River Lagoon stretches for 155 miles and includes Mosquito Lagoon, the Indian River and the Banana River. Hard-pulling jack crevalle appear in large schools in the Indian River Lagoon and coastal waters during the springtime. Jack crevalle is a species that fly fishermen and light tackle anglers fish for regularly. This fish is common in both inshore waters and the open sea. Schools of jacks feed on baitfish near the surface with a commotion that can be seen from a long distance, making them easy targets for anglers.

Ocean whiting, weakfish, sea bass and sheepshead are species that anglers catch year-round in the Indian River Lagoon. The blackstriped sheepshead can be found near oyster bars, seawalls and in tidal creeks inshore where they can be tempted with shrimp and fiddler crabs. They spawn near shore in late winter and early spring. Sheepshead caught offshore commonly weigh up to eight pounds.

SEBASTIAN INLET

In the spring, spotted seatrout and ladyfish can be found in the Sebastian Inlet area on drop-offs near spoil islands and deeper channels. Seatrout spawn inshore between March and November near seagrass beds. This species is often found inshore and near shore over grass, sand and mud bottoms. In winter, sea trout move into still, deep waters.


Just eight miles north of Vero Beach on Florida's east coast is the city of Sebastian. Recognized as fishing hotspot, it is a little known gem and the secret vacation retreat for many south Florida fishermen. What sport fisherman like best is the Sebastian Inlet, which allows for easy access to offshore fishing grounds. They also appreciate that boat slips are still available here, unlike in the Florida Keys. For saltwater anglers, Sebastian is just about perfect. It's a secret paradise. Sport fishermen know that outside of the Keys (which can be a hassle to get to) Sebastian has the best fishing. According to Tookie Smith, manager of Beach Cove-a factory-built home community in Sebastian-has seen a steady stream of sport fishermen interested in the area and looking for second homes.

Just venture a few miles out of the Sebastian Inlet and you can catch some monster-size wahoo, fill your boat with dorado and amberjack, or drop a line deep and reel in a massive grouper. Diehard fishermen can "rig up" some Ballyhoo and trawl the surface for blue marlin.

FLORIDA'S EAST COAST

The migratory tarpon is a popular sport fish found in the waters off Florida's East Coast. Tarpon populations are strongest during spring, summer and fall. It is not uncommon to see schools of 50 to 100 tarpon, and anglers can frequently catch tarpon weighing 40 to 50 pounds in this area.

Those looking to surf fish while at the beach can find a variety of species all year long. Red drum, pompano and whiting are caught in the Atlantic surf throughout the year.
